YOU CAN DIAL 9-8-8 FOR A MENTAL HEALTH **EMERGENCY**

The three-digit code is like 911, but for mental health emergencies

On July 16, the 10-digit National Suicide Prevention Lifeline transitioned to 988—an easy-to-remember 3-digit number for 24/7 crisis care. The lifeline, which also links to the Veterans Crisis Line, follows a three-year joint effort by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Federal Communications Commission (FCC), and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to put crisis care more in reach for people in need.

IF I DON'T WANT TO CALL 9-8-8, DO I HAVE OTHER OPTIONS?

Although the U.S. doesn't have a national, government-run mental health hotline that pledges not to call police without callers' consent, several alternatives that are smaller than 988 aim to decrease law enforcement involvement.

"Warm" lines are one option. They're typically staffed by "peers," people who have experienced mental health challenges. They focus less on crisis intervention and more on emotional support to prevent crises. You can find a directory of warm lines by state here.

Below are other hotlines and resources. This is not a comprehensive list, and some resources may limit their services geographically.

<u>Blackline</u> is a hotline geared toward the Black, Black LGBTQ+, brown, Native, & Muslim communities <u>Kiva Centers</u> offers daily online peer support groups

Trans Lifeline is a hotline for trans and questioning individuals

CHILD TRENDS RELEASES BRIEF: ADDRESSING DISCRIMINATION SUPPORTS YOUTH SUICIDE PREVENTION EFFORTS

Suicide is the third leading cause of death among youth ages 15 to 19 and the second leading cause among youth ages 10 to 14.[1] As state health and education leaders work to address the health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic—including those related to mental health—they should examine patterns of suicide risk across different groups of youth. For example, the percentage of Black, Indigenous, and other People of Color (BIPOC)[2]; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer/questioning youth (LGBTQ) [2],[3]; and youth with disabilities[4] who report suicide attempts is higher than that of their peers. Experiences of identity-based discrimination are associated with increased risk of suicide, especially among youth with multiple marginalized identities.[5] To effectively reduce suicide among youth with the highest risk, state leaders must understand the relationship between discrimination and suicide risk. State leaders must also support efforts to reduce exposure to discrimination among youth.

This brief summarizes youth suicide risk patterns from recent nationwide surveys, highlights variation in suicide attempts across states, and reports findings from a review of state suicide prevention plans to determine whether they address discrimination as a risk factor for youth suicides. Tables at the end of the brief include 2019 Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) data on suicide attempts by race/ethnicity and sexual orientation to enable comparisons across different groups within and across states.
